Ms. Penisten stated that the DEQ proposes to amend OAC 252:4, Subchapter 7 (Environmental Permit Process - Fees and fee refunds) to clarify existing rules pertaining to the refund of permit application fees and to allow for refund of application fees in certain situations. The proposed rulemaking would also allow DEQ to retain a percentage of the amount to be refunded (up to \$500) in order to cover the agency's costs in processing permit applications and refunds. Following no questions or comments by the Board or the public, Mr. Munson called for a motion. Mr. Griesel moved to approve and Mr. Wendling made the second.

Rulemaking – OAC 252:4 Rules of Practice and Procedure (Air Quality) – Mr. Munson called upon Ms. Laura Lodes, Chair of the Air Quality Advisory Council (AQAC), to present the air rule. Ms. Lodes stated that the DEQ proposes to amend OAC 252:4, Subchapter 7, (Environmental Permit Process Notices – Additional notice content requirements for Clean Air Act Permits) to align the Department's notice requirements for Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD) permits with those promulgated by EPA. This will remove an obstacle in EPA Region 6's review and approval process for related portions of Oklahoma's State

Implementation Plan. Following no questions or comments by the Board or the public, Mr. Munson called for a motion. Mr. Kinder moved to approve and Dr. Hammon made the second.

Rulemaking - OAC 252:100 Air Pollution Control - Ms. Lodes stated that the DEQ proposes to amend OAC 252:100, Subchapter 7, (Permits for Minor Facilities — Permit By Rule (PBR) Oil and natural gas sector) in order to add a reference to EPA's recently promulgated New Source Performance Standards (NSPS) in 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart OOOOa. The proposed amendment clarifies source eligibility criteria for the Oil and Natural Gas sector PBR. Following no questions or comments by the Board or the public, Mr. Munson called for a motion. Rulemaking – OAC 252:515 Management of Solid Waste – Mr. Munson called upon Mr. Jeff Shepherd, Chair of the Solid Waste Management Advisory Council (SWMAC), to present the rule. Mr. Shepherd stated that the DEQ proposes to amend OAC 252:515 and to create a new Subchapter, OAC 252:515-43, to allow for a tiered permitting and regulatory structure for different classes of solid waste composting facilities. The classes of facilities are based on the type and quantity of material to be received and composted at a particular facility. All proposed amendments to OAC 252:515 are associated with the creation of the new Subchapter and are necessary to ensure consistency with the new Subchapter. Following questions by the Board and none by the public, Mr. Munson called for a motion. Mr. Blankenship moved to approve and Mr. Ferrell made the second.

Rulemaking – OAC 252:4 Rules of Practice and Procedure (Solid Waste) – Mr. Shepherd stated that the DEQ proposes to amend OAC 252:4, Subchapter 7 (Environmental Permit Process Land Protection Division Tiers and Time Lines) to modify and clarify the permitting process requirements and associated tiers that apply to solid waste composting facilities. These amendments are related to the amendments described in Agenda Item #9 and support the proposed new Subchapter 43 of OAC 252:515, which allows for a tiered permitting and regulatory structure for different classes of solid waste composting facilities. Following no questions or comments by the Board or the public, Mr. Munson called for a motion. Mr. Sims moved to approve and Mr. Wendling made the second.

Rulemaking – OAC 252:517 Disposal of Coal Combustion Residuals from Electric Utilities – Mr. Shepherd stated that the DEQ proposes to amend OAC 252:517, Subchapters 9 and 15 in response to recent EPA amendments to 40 CFR Part 257, Subpart D (Federal CCR Rule). DEQ adopted the federal CCR requirements to ensure the state and federal regulations pertaining to coal combustion residuals (CCR) disposal are uniform. The amendments to the Federal CCR Rule, as well as the proposed amendments to OAC 252:517, extend certain deadlines for owners/operators of the impoundments that had previously been eligible for "early closure" and are now subject to the requirements for existing surface impoundments. Following no questions or comments by the Board or the public, Mr. Munson called for a motion. Mr. Ferrell moved to approve and Mr. Blankenship made the second.

The proposed rulemaking also includes authority for DEQ to approve variances for these systems. Additionally, the DEQ proposes to revoke and replace the existing Appendix A to illustrate the rule's technical requirements and update the drawings.
