FIELDS: We do not have a quorum.</p> <p>6 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Next item is Chairperson's</p> <p>7 report.</p> <p>8 Our main item of business today is we have two new</p> <p>9 members of the committee here. Mr. Kinnamon Clark is</p> <p>10 replacing Noble Stanfield, environmental organizations.</p> <p>11 Mr. Clark, would you care to give us a brief bio?</p> <p>12 MR. CLARK: Good morning. My name is Kinnamon</p> <p>13 Clark. I'm the environmental engineer for the Charles</p> <p>14 Machine Works, known as Ditch Witch, in Perry, Oklahoma.</p> <p>15 I've been at Ditch Witch for about ten years. I was</p> <p>16 also previously our combined safety manager, so come</p> <p>17 from the manufacturing role on that side of industry.</p> <p>18 I also have an active farm that I operate on the</p> <p>19 side that keeps me busy in the evenings. And it's a fun</p> <p>20 situation resource tying those two worlds together of</p> <p>21 manufacturing and the hands-on restoring a bunch of old</p> <p>22 farmland at the same time.</p> <p>23 So it is a pleasure to be here, and hope I can be</p> <p>24 of service.</p> <p>25 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Thank you.</p>	<p style="text-align: right; margin: 0;">Page 5</p> <p>1 Another new member that's present today is Mr. Matt</p> <p>2 Cobb, who's replacing Bob Kennedy, representing the</p> <p>3 industry.</p> <p>4 MR. COBB: Good morning, I'm Matt Cobb. I was</p> <p>5 director of environmental health and safety for the</p> <p>6 Education and Development Corp., now doing consulting</p> <p>7 work for them and several other companies. I do a lot</p> <p>8 of work with our conservation, National Wildlife</p> <p>9 Conservation, (inaudible) management, National Wild</p> <p>10 Turkey Federation. So the environment is obviously</p> <p>11 very, very important, so it's an honor to be on this</p> <p>12 council and looking forward to making some really neat</p> <p>13 decisions and figuring out what we can do to do better.</p> <p>14 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Thank you.</p> <p>15 The other member who's not present today is Dale</p> <p>16 Copeland. He's replacing Debra Smith.</p> <p>17 And I would like to thank Noble Stanfield, Bob</p> <p>18 Kennedy, and Debra Smith for their past service. We</p> <p>19 appreciate it.</p> <p>20 Next item on the agenda is the director's report.</p> <p>21 Ms. Dixon.</p> <p>22 MS. DIXON: Good morning, everyone.</p> <p>23 It's great to see some of our new members, and I'm</p> <p>24 glad I got to meet you earlier this morning.</p> <p>25 Thank you, guys, for your service. We realize this</p>

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1 is voluntary, but it's an important role in rule making
2 and it really helps us make sure that we make informed
3 decisions as we pursue rule making.
4 I think a lesson learned here, if you don't have
5 anything to vote on on the agenda, you don't get a
6 quorum. But we appreciate you guys being here today.
7 I usually use this time to share some information,
8 some general information about what's going on in the
9 agency and in our division. So I'm just going to share
10 a few things with you guys this morning.
11 First, you know, we spent about a year and a half
12 teleworking because of COVID, and June 1st we came back
13 to the office, back to our routine inspections. We
14 learned a lot during that experience, and it's led to us
15 having a formal permanent telework policy.
16 So our employees get to telework up to three days a
17 week with their manager's approval. We think it's good
18 for morale, it's good for recruitment of new employees.
19 We have learned that we did not have a disruption
20 in customer service through telework. When we're
21 teleworking, we're working. So we're happy that we have
22 that in place now. A lot of employees are happy about
23 that.
24 One other note is we've changed our dress policy.
25 I don't know how long it will last this way, but it's

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1 hazardous waste disposal fee by 50 cents, so it went
2 from \$9 to \$9.50 per ton. And the large quantity
3 generator minimum payment is \$300. Before it was
4 three -- it was 100, and it cost money per waste stream.
5 So it's a equitable deal. I think everybody's
6 happy about it. And it really reduces the reporting
7 burden on our customers, so we're happy about that.
8 We've had some personnel changes. I was just
9 telling Lee about that. Fenton Rood, who was a
10 long-time employee, a public servant of the state -- I
11 think he always introduced himself as "The Garbage
12 Man" -- retired after over 40 years of service in -- I
13 think he retired in November. We have replaced him with
14 Clifton Hoyle, who's here today.
15 Cliff, you want to stand up?
16 (Mr. Hoyle stands.)
17 MS. DIXON: He is the assistant director of our
18 division. He has a work history in the solid waste
19 program, used tire program, hazardous waste inspections,
20 SARA Title III. So he's bringing a lot to the table.
21 He also has a degree from OU and one from OSU, so he can
22 keep our staff happy with that balance.
23 We also -- I don't know how many of you know Ray
24 Roberts. He passed away unexpectedly in March. It was
25 a big loss to our staff from a personal and a

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1 "Dress for your day." So we get to wear jeans unless
2 we're at a formal meeting like this, if we want to.
3 And it's unbelievable to me how many people are
4 happy about wearing jeans every day. So it's another
5 thing that's good for morale. So just thought I'd share
6 that with you guys.
7 A couple of key pieces of legislation that were
8 passed this last session that may be of interest to this
9 council and impacted our division.
10 One was an advanced recycling bill that helps
11 recycle plastics that are hard to recycle. So it
12 confirms that source-separated is material, plastics,
13 are -- don't require a permit.
14 And we're hopeful that it will be good for the
15 economy and good for the environment, so we'll see
16 how -- we don't have any facilities to date, but we'll
17 see how that works.
18 More specific about hazardous waste, we finally,
19 after many years, were able to get rid of an obsolete
20 rule or statute that required disposal plans. It was --
21 it predated RCRA, and it's been superseded by
22 E-Manifest -- by EPA's manifest. So it was on the
23 books, it was sort of a regulatory and reporting burden
24 to our customers, so now it's off the books.
25 To stay revenue neutral, though, we increased the

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1 professional capacity. So we made some changes.
2 Amy Britton is now stepping into that role that he
3 played to review and make sure that we're making
4 consistent decisions about risk and groundwater.
5 So Amy's been with us for a long time. She managed
6 our Superfund program. So it'll be good, but we all
7 miss Ray.
8 The agency has a big initiative to pursue lean
9 management to improve our efficiencies, and we continue
10 to work on that. The big focus right now for agency is
11 approving permit timelines, so that would include our
12 RCRA permitting.
13 So we have -- each division has champions that know
14 the process, and we're going all in on lean management.
15 So you'll probably hear about that as time goes on,
16 especially about the results from that.
17 One interesting story I'd like to share. If you
18 guys can think back to February when we were all
19 hunkered down and snowed in with the big freeze,
20 something that was happening across the state was public
21 water and wastewater systems were having all kinds of
22 problems.
23 Pipes were breaking, pumps were breaking and, you
24 know, public water supply is probably the most important
25 thing this agency oversees.

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1 So during these weeks we had -- our water quality
2 staff at our legal field offices were working really
3 closely with systems all across the state.
4 At the end of the day there were 255 public water
5 systems that were impacted, 30 wastewater systems that
6 were impacted. We had 110 boil orders. And there's
7 still -- out of all of those, there's still six
8 facilities that are still not 100 percent, waiting on
9 machinery, equipment, whatever.
10 But the good-news story is that the partnership
11 that our staff -- the role they played with the public
12 water supply municipalities, with rural water, with
13 tribal governments, they were just in there working
14 really hard and deserve a lot of recognition for their
15 hard work.
16 And the last thing I was going to share with you
17 is, in December of this year, the National Brownfields
18 Conference, which is a really big deal, is coming to
19 Oklahoma City.
20 It's been postponed because of COVID a couple of
21 times, but I think this is a hard and fast date,
22 December 8 through 11. The National Brownfields
23 Conference is going to be in the new convention center
24 here downtown.
25 And if you don't know anything about it, I

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1 MR. EDWARDS: Thank you, Mr. Grater.
2 Kelly actually covered some of what I was going to
3 say. The main thing I was going to do is sort of give
4 the new members kind of an overview -- a bird's-eye view
5 of kind what the purpose is -- the main purpose of the
6 October meeting.
7 It's a rule-making meeting. It's the one
8 rule-making meeting that we schedule each year. And
9 usually the main thing we do is we update the
10 incorporation by reference. And so that's in subchapter
11 3 of the state rules. I hope I have that right.
12 And, really, it's just changing the date that we
13 changed the previous year. So last year's rule making,
14 we changed the date from '19 to '20, 2019 to 2020. This
15 year we'll change it from 2020 to '21.
16 What that accomplishes is it brings in any federal
17 rule changes that occurred from July 1 of the previous
18 year to June 30th of the current year. So it's pretty
19 simple, the concept.
20 There are lots of new rules that come out from EPA
21 every year, but only some of them are relevant for RCRA.
22 And even within that, only some of those are actually
23 required for us to incorporate to maintain our program
24 status.
25 We have to maintain an equivalent program to the

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1 encourage you to check it out. We have some information
2 on our web page. I'm not sure registration is open, but
3 it's a good place to network, to learn about
4 redevelopment and cleanup of contaminated properties.
5 So I would encourage you guys to check it out if you're
6 interested.
7 And that's all I have. If you have questions, I'm
8 happy to take them.
9 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Any questions from the
10 council?
11 (No response.)
12 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Any questions from the
13 public?
14 (No response.)
15 CHAIRMAN GRATER: I would like to say at this
16 time that I was shocked to find Mr. Roberts had passed.
17 He was an exemplary individual, did a great deal of very
18 fine service for the state and was an absolute joy to
19 work with. I'm saddened by that personally, and I think
20 I speak for the rest of the council and anyone that knew
21 him.
22 We have a discussion on the hazardous waste
23 management committee's October rule meeting in context
24 of recent statutory changes.
25 Mr. Edwards.

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1 federal in order to maintain our authorization status,
2 and so the mechanism to ensure that we do that is the
3 EPA has a website where they will list what rules came
4 out during that time period. Very convenient.
5 I have a copy of the rule we have to incorporate
6 here. And I'll spare you some of the details on it
7 unless you want the details. Probably plan to give more
8 in October.
9 But the short version is it's a modernization of
10 the ignitable liquids determination. So it's a fancy
11 way of saying that, basically, they're going to allow
12 non-mercury thermometers when testing for ignitable
13 liquids. That's oversimplification. There's several
14 other modernizations that they're doing for that,
15 particular characteristics.
16 So, like I said, I could give you more details if
17 you want. There's -- one of them is they're finalizing
18 updates to correct cross-references to U.S. DOT
19 regulations and to remove obsolete information in the
20 ignitability regulation.
21 So it's pretty -- you know, it's essentially
22 housekeeping to some extent, with the ignitability
23 regulations and a modernization. So that's the new rule
24 that we'll be incorporating. And that's sort of the
25 main topic.

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1 But then the second thing that we have to do in
2 October is, as Kelly referenced, there were statutory
3 changes that occurred during the last year. I think you
4 guys are probably familiar with them. If not, they were
5 to Chapter 105, 119, and 121 in the statutes. And
6 those, basically, are the statutes that cover Disposal
7 Plans.
8 I won't go into the details. Kelly just went into
9 them, what they changed. But because the statutes
10 changed, this council has a responsibility to change the
11 state rules so that they're not in conflict with those
12 statutes. So the rule-making meeting in October is when
13 we do that.
14 We're starting -- I was going through the state
15 rules some yesterday to figure out which subchapters
16 we're going to have to make modifications to. I think
17 it's mostly just going to be a couple of them.
18 Subchapter 5, which is additional generator
19 requirements, there's a couple -- several references to
20 disposal plans in that subchapter that we're going to
21 have to strike through.
22 And then I believe it's -- yeah, subchapter 21 of
23 state rules is fees. So obviously there's going to be
24 some changes to that. It's really not any more
25 complicated than that.

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1 Conference is in December and registration opens
2 August 9th.
3 So we also recently found out that the community
4 reception is going to be held at the First Americans
5 Museum. That's that Thursday that week. So make sure
6 you all attend. It should be really neat to get to see
7 the museum and showcase Oklahoma.
8 Raise your hand if this is your first council
9 meeting? Yeah. Mine too.
10 Who here has heard of Brownfields?
11 (Hands raised.)
12 MS. SAMWEL: Okay. Good. Well, for those of
13 you that haven't, the definition of "brown fields" is
14 any site that has lost value because it's perceived to
15 be contaminated.
16 So think of your abandoned gas station that's not
17 being used anymore, everybody's afraid to buy it.
18 That's a typical Brownfield site. Our Brownfield
19 program is voluntary, and sites that finish our
20 certificate program are given both state liability
21 relief and federal Superfund liability relief.
22 We receive federal grants from EPA to operate. One
23 of the grants that we receive is a revolving loan fund,
24 and that helps people clean up environmental
25 contamination at sites. It's great for us, too, because

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1 There may be a couple other references in the state
2 rules that we have to pare down and make some changes
3 to, but in advance of the October meeting we'll have the
4 rule-making documents ready to go and we can have more
5 discussion on them then, or now.
6 Let's see. That's really it. I think, in addition
7 to those hazardous waste things, we'll have the
8 Brownfields presentation, which I think the staff will
9 give you in here in a minute.
10 But that's really all I have. So if you have any
11 questions, I'll be happy to answer.
12 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Questions from the council?
13 (No response.)
14 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Don't appear to be any.
15 Questions from the public for Mr. Edwards?
16 (No response.)
17 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Do not appear to be.
18 The next item on the discussion is the DEQ's
19 proposed updates to subchapters 1, 3, 5, and 7 of
20 OAC 252, 221 Brownfields, introduction and presentation
21 by Aron Samwel.
22 MS. SAMWEL: Hello, my name is Aron Samwel, and
23 I'm the Brownfields manager at DEQ.
24 Before I start with the rules updates, I just
25 wanted to point out, yes, the National Brownfields

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1 the money comes back so we get to loan it out again.
2 Heather Mallory is our revolving loan fund
3 coordinator, and she is going to walk us through the
4 updates that we want to make with our rules.
5 The last time we did our rules, it was 2011. So
6 it's been ten years. We had a hard time during COVID
7 because our proposals need to be put in a public place
8 for comment, but during COVID all the public places were
9 shut down. So we want to be able to have online comment
10 and things like that.
11 We also have changed our fund manager. It used to
12 be the Department of Commerce. So there's just some
13 things we need to update on our rules, and Heather is
14 going to walk you through that.
15 Do you all have any questions for me before Heather
16 comes up?
17 (No response.)
18 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Okay. All right. I'll give
19 the mike over to Heather. Thank you, guys.
20 MS. MALLORY: Hello, I'm Heather Mallory, and
21 I'm the Brownfields revolving loan fund coordinator.
22 And she gave a good intro, so I'm just going to get
23 right into our changes. And if we did small things like
24 a space or a typo, I'm not going to over those.
25 So in Section 1-4, we removed an outdated statute

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1 and replaced it with the current version.
2 In 1-6, just removed on an outdated statute, no
3 longer any good.
4 And then 3-3 in -- I guess that's subsection 6, or
5 no subsection 9. I'm sorry. This is where we moved
6 from two paper copies to one and allowed an electronic
7 copy. And we added wording, as instructed by DEQ. So,
8 basically, we're just working with each participant to
9 see what their comfort level is.
10 And, honestly, the two papers copies, we didn't
11 need them anymore because we moved to an electronic file
12 system in the last ten years, so that's just kind of
13 obsolete and unnecessary.
14 And 3-5, subpart A, we're going to say that you can
15 file your public notice just electronically, maybe put
16 it on the website or some other place where it can be
17 publicly accessible, which is so much easier, because
18 not everybody looks at a newspaper anymore and
19 everybody's looking at the web page.
20 B, similar -- similar wording, just allow for the
21 website.
22 7-1, now we're getting -- this is revolving loan
23 fund and lots of changes here because, over time, this
24 is kind of driven by federal grants and so constantly
25 gives us new terms and conditions. And some of this

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1 somewhere else. And then we added different things.
2 And we realized we didn't define things like what
3 is the Brownfields revolving loan fund and what are
4 grantees and program income, that's sort of thing.
5 The post closeout programming is important because
6 we didn't have that ten years ago when we created rules,
7 because that's from repaid loans. And now we do have
8 money coming from in from repaid loans, so we need to be
9 able to put a term to that.
10 In 7-3, we added several different things for our
11 borrower eligibility because the repaid loans has
12 different requirements than the grant does. So we had
13 to kind of clarify that just so folks would know where
14 they stood and what to expect from us.
15 Same for eligible uses in 7-4. It was all just
16 because of the repaid loans versus the grant
17 terminology. And same for 7-5 B and C.
18 7-7 is the part D. That was just to get rid of an
19 outdated statute.
20 7-8, part 6B, and you'll see it again in 7-9, that
21 is old terminology from the original pilot grant, and
22 now it's called Community Relations Plan instead of
23 (inaudible) plan. So just trying to update things.
24 In 7-9, we also specified about the public comment
25 period for the (inaudible), just to clarify things

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1 just kind of went obsolete on us, and other things are
2 just outdated laws that we're striking out.
3 So in 7-1-A, we kind of did some rewording because
4 we realized Executive Order 98-37 was no longer in
5 existence, so we just kind of struck that out and added
6 some different wording that kind of clarified what our
7 program is.
8 And then also Executive Order -- yeah, it appears
9 yet again in B., and so we struck that out.
10 And D, this is where -- we used to have the
11 Department of Commerce manage, like, our loan payments
12 and do kind of like or loan terms and that sort of thing
13 for us.
14 And as of about three years ago we brought that
15 in-house because the guy retired there. So we said,
16 okay, we're not going to fill that position. So we need
17 to strike that out so the Department of Commerce doesn't
18 look like they have some obligation there.
19 Part E updates statutes and then removed a whole
20 bunch of statutes, because every time we get new grant
21 terms and conditions, EPA changes that. And so we
22 thought, why not just make it very general since it's a
23 constantly moving target.
24 And then in sub 2, we struck out several
25 definitions just for clarity and because they were cited


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1 because folks were constantly confused.
2 We also talked about the administrative record
3 could be electronic or hard copy or both. We were --
4 before, only had to do hard copy and a paper.
5 So part C, we added the statute, and then also that
6 can be made electronically as well instead of just
7 newspaper.
8 Then at 7-10, we specified the 30-day public
9 comment period for the applicants that was not stated in
10 there.
11 7-11, we struck out an unneeded sentence. And then
12 further on down, part 4, we also cited applicable state
13 regulations because we realized that wasn't in there,
14 and it follows the same reg.
15 6, just added some updated statutes that had been
16 found in our grant.
17 And then, yet again, in -- let's see, which one is
18 that? Six? No. 10 of that same section, where it
19 talked about the closeout program, which is the repaid
20 loans.
21 And that's the gist of it all. So if you have any
22 questions let us know.
23 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Any questions from council?
24 Any questions from the public?
25 (No response.)

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1 CHAIRMAN GRATER: Do not seem to be.
 2 Next item would be new business limited to any
 3 matter not known or which could not be reasonably
 4 foreseen prior to the time of posting the agenda 24
 5 hours prior to the meeting.
 6 Are there any such comments?
 7 (No response.)
 8 CHAIRMAN GRATER: None appear to be.
 9 Next item would be to adjourn.
 10 If no one has any objection, I move -- is there a
 11 move to adjourn?
