1 **MR. HOYLE:** Yes. Here. I'm here.
2 **MS. FIELDS:** Okay. We have a quorum.
3 **MR. HOYLE:** Thank you very much.
4 All right. So I sent out the minutes from
5 our previous meeting, which was December of 2019,
6 which was crazy, so hopefully you've had a chance to
7 review that, and, if so, I'll entertain a motion and
8 second to approve.
9 **MR. DRISCOLL:** Curtis Driscoll, I motion to
10 accept the meeting minutes as written.
11 **MR. MCCOY:** Jack McCoy, second.
12 **MR. HOYLE:** All right. I have a motion and a
13 second. All in favor, say aye.
14 **MULTIPLE SPEAKERS:** Aye.
15 **MR. HOYLE:** Oppose, same response.
16 Motion carries. Minutes approved.
17 All right. So going down our agenda, 2020
18 was indeed a very strange year, and in all that
19 strangeness, we got two new commission members, so
20 I'd like to take a moment to introduce them.
21 First we have Chief Carl Hickman, our new
22 state fire marshal. Chief Hickman holds a degree in
23 municipal fire protection from Oklahoma State
24 University, go Pokes, and is an alumni member of the
25 National Fire Academy. While attending college at

1 OSU, Hickman was a student firefighter with the
 2 Stillwater Fire Department, began his paid career
 3 with the Sulphur Fire Department in 1982 and was
 4 eventually promoted to fire chief for the city and
 5 worked as an investigator with the Oklahoma state
 6 fire marshal's office. He's also served as volunteer
 7 firefighter for Davis, Oklahoma, as well.
 8 2005 he accepted the chief position at the
 9 Mustang Fire Department and served as Mustang's fire
 10 chief for almost 13 years from 2005 until his
 11 retirement in December 2017, but he didn't stay
 12 retired long and the pandemic called him in October
 13 2020 and he was asked to serve as the state fire
 14 marshal in a very unique time. So please welcome
 15 Carl Hickman.
 16 Chief, you got anything to say?
 17 **MR. HICKMAN:** Well, thanks, first of all, for
 18 that -- for all that. I'd forgotten some of that. I
 19 guess when you've been around 40 years, you forget
 20 what all you did maybe.
 21 Actually, I started here in 2019, so October
 22 of 2019 was really when I came here. So I would just
 23 tell this committee today that when I came in, I came
 24 in obviously as the interim and told them that I was
 25 not their long-term -- I didn't plan on being here

1 long term. I really looked at being here three or
 2 four months at the time. And then, of course, COVID
 3 and with all the things that went on with that, here
 4 it is, 18 months later and I'm still here.
 5 So -- but I have announced that I really am
 6 going to retire, I hope for good, the end of this
 7 month. So May the 1st there will be a new state fire
 8 marshal, but as long as I'm here, I'm in 100 percent.
 9 So this may be my only chance to be a member of this
 10 committee, but I'm pleased to be here. Thank you.
 11 **MR. HOYLE:** That'll work. We appreciate you
 12 showing up.
 13 So our other new commission member
 14 representing the regulated industry is Mr. Chad
 15 Graves, and he's the staff environmental engineer at
 16 the Valero refinery in Ardmore, Oklahoma, and has
 17 been at the refinery since 1994. He has an
 18 environmental science degree from East Central
 19 University, go Tigers. I played baseball there.
 20 Chad is a member of the facilities and
 21 merchant response team serving as a firefighter and a
 22 member of the rogue rescue team, member of the
 23 medical team, as a national registered EMT, served on
 24 the Valero instant command system as the spill
 25 response coordinator.

1 He and his wife Becky have three children,
 2 two daughters who are seniors in college, and a son
 3 who's a sophomore in high school. Chad is a member
 4 of the Chickasaw Nation, active member of the First
 5 Baptist Church of Ardmore, and his hobbies include
 6 hunting and spending time on the lake. I can
 7 appreciate that. And announcing high school sports
 8 there in Ardmore also. So please welcome Mr. Chad
 9 Graves.
 10 Mr. Graves, got anything to say?
 11 **MR. GRAVES:** No. Happy to be here and I
 12 appreciate the opportunities.
 13 **MR. HOYLE:** Glad you're here. Our agency has
 14 a long history of working very closely with the
 15 Valero refinery, it's always been a great partnership
 16 and easy to work with you guys, so glad you're on
 17 this commission.
 18 My staff, we've had some changes also. We've
 19 got a new staff member here at DEQ, Mr. Tommy
 20 Holbrook. Tommy comes after many years of serving at
 21 the -- with the baboon research facility,
 22 Mr. Holbrook?
 23 **MR. HOLBROOK:** That's it. The University of
 24 Oklahoma.
 25 **MR. HOYLE:** So he's our resident monkey

1 farmer, that's what we like to say.
 2 Some additional changes. I, myself, have
 3 accepted a new position here within the agency. I'm
 4 the new assistant division director for land
 5 protection, so this potentially could be my last
 6 meeting. We'll see how it goes.
 7 In addition to that, Mr. Bergman has been
 8 threatening retirement for several years, but he's
 9 acting like he's serious now, so this potentially
 10 could be Mr. Bergman's last meeting as well, which is
 11 -- which is saying a lot since Mr. Bergman is
 12 responsible basically for building this program here
 13 at DEQ from the ground up.
 14 So, Mr. Bergman, do you have anything to say
 15 or want to correct my facts in any way?
 16 You're on mute, Mr. Bergman.
 17 **MR. BERGMAN:** No corrections, really. I will
 18 continue to work in hazmat for the State of Oklahoma.
 19 As far as I know, I have no plans to discontinue the
 20 hazmat training that I do, nor the LEPC support that
 21 I do, if asked, and I'm signed up for two more years
 22 as the president of the National Association of SARA
 23 Title III Program Officials. And if this body wants
 24 me to continue to contribute, I'm happy to do that as
 25 well. What I'm probably not going to be happy to do,

1 and maybe Carl's the same way, is go down to the
 2 office every day, you know. I'm perfectly willing to
 3 be a resource and a member or whatever you guys want.
 4 I'm not dropping out of life, just dropping out of
 5 everyday work, you know. I'll do the -- I'll do the
 6 part-time stuff.
 7 **MR. HOYLE:** All right. Well, of course, you
 8 know I appreciate that and the agency appreciates
 9 everything you've done, Tom, so it's good to hear.
 10 **MR. BERGMAN:** Yeah, I got class tomorrow.
 11 I've got classes scheduled from here to Tucumcari
 12 now.
 13 **MR. HOYLE:** Opened back up. That's right.
 14 All right. Moving along here. Ms. Bonnie
 15 McKelvey, do you want to provide us an update on the
 16 OEM grant and training classes?
 17 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Well, it'll be kind of short
 18 because I actually did not prepare a good report for
 19 you. I will say -- I do want to thank Tom, though,
 20 for all the support he's provided, my goodness, for
 21 our projects that we've had through the state, OEM
 22 office, with the LEPC's and with the -- another
 23 project using our HMEP money, and he's been such a
 24 valuable resource and I'm hoping will continue to be
 25 so. So looking forward to working with him, continue

1 working with him.
 2 I note we have -- obviously, the training
 3 took a little pause as far as with OSU fire service
 4 training; however, John Carpenter has done a
 5 magnificent job of continuing training and actually
 6 just going to town on training. He's provided a lot.
 7 We had the little pause and he just figured out some
 8 ways to do the training safely. I don't have numbers
 9 for how many trainings he's done, but it's been a lot
 10 compared to what he had to face, you know, due to the
 11 COVID restrictions.
 12 We were also -- with the HMEP money, in lieu
 13 of the training, were able to purchase some
 14 monitoring equipment, rather high-dollar monitoring
 15 equipment for our OSU fire service training to use
 16 for their training, so that was a big boost and -- to
 17 their program.
 18 The grant, I have applied for the grant for
 19 this year. I haven't heard back yet. We have closed
 20 the past grant and so the -- this year will be the
 21 three for this round of grants. It's a three-year
 22 grant now as of about six years ago. So the next
 23 grant will be awarded by September, October of 2021.
 24 So that's really kind of all I have to
 25 report. I can send something out with more detail if

 2 **MR. HOYLE:** Will do. I can do that, for
 3 sure. Thank you, Ms. Bonnie.
 4 **MS. MCKELVEY:** I appreciate it.
 5 **MR. HOYLE:** Good to hear your voice.
 6 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Yeah, it's good to hear all of
 7 you all's voice and welcome all the new people. And
 8 I'm going to miss you and Tom on this meeting. You
 9 all been around for a minute.
 10 I want to thank you also, Cliff, for your
 11 leadership on this. You've been a great asset too
 12 and we appreciate all you've done.
 13 **MR. HOYLE:** Well, it's been fun, if nothing
 14 else, how about that?
 15 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Right. It's been interesting.
 16 **MR. HOYLE:** All right. So we've got our DEQ
 17 data management report coming up.
 18 Boys, we're ready for the show. Who's going
 19 to lead it?
 20 **MR. WORMUS:** Cliff, just give me one second
 21 to get it set up so I have everything on one screen.
 22 **MR. HOYLE:** Okay. Matt, if you can't tell,
 23 is our information and technology guru, especially
 24 here in the Land Protection Division. He does all of
 25 our council meetings.

1 **MR. DRISCOLL:** Hey, Cliff, Curtis here.
 2 **MR. HOYLE:** Yeah.
 3 **MR. DRISCOLL:** I'd like to tag in with part
 4 of Bonnie's report. When we were working through
 5 your office to buy those Hazmat Elites we used the
 6 FT-IR technology, we ran out of funding and so OSU
 7 reached out to OEM and they were able to pull in that
 8 technology for fire service training so that when
 9 they do that training, they actually have actual
 10 equipment to take to the stations to do
 11 demonstrations, do training, you know, so that was --
 12 they did a great job stepping up for us there.
 13 **MR. HOYLE:** Excellent. Good to hear.
 14 **MR. DRISCOLL:** So shout-out to OEM.
 15 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Thank you, Curtis.
 16 **MR. DRISCOLL:** Absolutely, Bonnie.
 17 **MR. WORMUS:** All right. Can everyone see the
 18 screen and the little slide show?
 19 **MR. HOYLE:** Indeed.
 20 **MR. WORMUS:** Awesome.
 21 All right. So here's the latest updates from
 22 **DEQ:** We just finished up Tier 2 reporting, and as of
 23 yesterday afternoon we had 49,335 reports collected
 24 and that puts us about 94 percent of everything that
 25 was collected last year. So there's still more

1 auditing that needs to get done, but we're, luckily,
 2 at approximately like 95 percentile that we start
 3 sending out files to everyone, so that should
 4 be happening within the day, so that's good there.
 5 Here's the breakdown of those 49,335: 1,425
 6 stored extremely hazardous substance materials; 2,748
 7 did not have any extremely hazardous substance
 8 materials stored on site; 41,797 were oil and gas
 9 wells; 3,323 were wind farms; 313 fell underneath the
 10 risk management program; and we had 42 that were
 11 large quantity generators of hazardous waste. So
 12 that's kind of the rough breakdown of everything
 13 right now. And then --
 14 **MR. HOYLE:** Hey, Matt, is that individual
 15 wind turbines?
 16 **MR. WORMUS:** Yes. Yes, it is. That's kind
 17 of broken down between I -- I think there was roughly
 18 about -- so I think we have eight or nine full wind
 19 farms that are filing reports with us now, so --
 20 but if someone would like, we can do a better break
 21 down of everything else. It's just we're over in
 22 MARPLOT right now and not over into the --
 23 **MR. GALLOWAY:** And Matt?
 24 **MR. WORMUS:** Yes.
 25 **MR. GALLOWAY:** That's a moving target,

1 because I'm getting about 200 more in Custer County.
 2 **MR. WORMUS:** Yeah. We had a few more that
 3 joined on for this year and I've made good contact
 4 with a large amount of the ownership groups that are
 5 running multiples of these and so they kind of know
 6 to file Tier 2, so looking at numbers. So I expect
 7 that number to keep going up, so that's been good for
 8 the past few years as we started off on that side
 9 quest of getting individual reports for each one of
 10 the towers to help you guys out. So that's kind of
 11 the Tier 2 breakdown.
 12 For the data management, our section,
 13 especially Tom and I were -- we kind of helped out
 14 with the beta testing for the new EPA CAMEO Data
 15 Manager software program and the yearly release of
 16 the Tier 2 submit programs. So the software that we
 17 use to store all the Tier 2 reports is an EPA -- it's
 18 an EPA MOA software and it's a full face as you can
 19 see in the photo where it kind of looks like the Tier
 20 2 reporting software, but it's enabled us to do
 21 -- add in multiple years and -- and like, for
 22 example, mine now has 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 data
 23 all stored into one area and we could also have
 24 information about routes and special locations just
 25 in one central location. And Tom was integral in the

1 alpha and beta testing for that software. So that's
 2 been fun to use.
 3 An update on our MOA numbers, so we'll do
 4 multiple years because we haven't -- it's been a
 5 while. So last year for FY2020 we got 72 out of 77
 6 counties and so far this year we've gotten 68 out of
 7 77 counties. And that's just a breakdown of which
 8 counties -- green is good, red -- red counties did
 9 not submit one last year, so that's kind of where we
 10 stand for now on the MOA's for the Tier 2
 11 distribution.
 12 For payment applications and if the
 13 spreadsheet was correct, we awarded \$43,000 in
 14 payment applications for the distribution of Tier 2
 15 reports last year, so that was good for those LEPCs.
 16 So as we mentioned too, CAMEO training is
 17 starting to ramp back up for Tom and everyone else,
 18 but this is a little snapshot of what was done in
 19 2020. Usually it's a map that's full of dots across
 20 the country, but because of travel restrictions,
 21 there's only three. There's one in Colorado Springs;
 22 Augusta, Georgia; and then Tom also implemented a
 23 virtual CAMEO training, so --
 24 **MR. HOYLE:** Was that just one virtual
 25 training, Tom, or multiple? Did you record it or

1 multiple times did you have virtual trainings?
 2 I think you're still muted, Tom.
 3 **MR. BERGMAN:** So that's something I started
 4 developing last summer and I did a trial cohort in
 5 October, after it'd been in development. And the --
 6 moving forward, what I've done is utilized -- went
 7 into partnership with a university out of Colorado
 8 who provides the training platform, if you will. To
 9 purchase one myself was astronomically expensive, it
 10 was like \$50,000. They have a platform currently,
 11 they're just kind of allowing me to use it, and I
 12 went ahead and scheduled and completed a training in
 13 August -- or, I'm sorry, in March and we're in the
 14 middle of doing one now. So I didn't really count
 15 those, but upcoming over the next five weeks, I'm
 16 going to go back and start doing in-person training,
 17 Yuma, Arizona; Greeley, Colorado; and Salem, Oregon,
 18 so I'm going to be out of the office for a while.
 19 Not that I was in office, anyway, because -- I'll be
 20 out of my house for a while.
 21 **MR. HOYLE:** All right, then.
 22 **MR. WORMUS:** So that's the latest on CAMEO
 23 training.
 24 We've also been doing a lot of training for
 25 Tier 2 reporting, so in December of 2019, Tom and I

1 held 10 training workshops in Oklahoma City, not
 2 including usual travel around the state, but just
 3 training opportunities. And we had over 210
 4 reporters for those workshops that we stored here at
 5 DEQ. And then last December we held a virtual
 6 training over on Zoom and had -- and for that
 7 training we had 212 members attended, and because it
 8 was also recorded, we were able to get it posted on
 9 the DEQ Youtube page as well and -- so that anyone
 10 who wanted to go back and watch it, they could have
 11 full access to it. And if anyone wants, that video
 12 is also linked in this presentation so you can watch
 13 Tom's training that was held last winter. So that's
 14 training.

15 As usual, we do a whole bunch of industry
 16 outreach and assistance, so in FY2020 between phone
 17 calls and emails we had over 8,515 phone calls and
 18 emails to industry regarding reporting. We also
 19 attended 25 LEPC meetings across the state and then
 20 so far in this fiscal year we've had 5,841. And then
 21 we've attended 26 LEPC meetings. And I'm imagining
 22 that will keep going up as more and more LEPCs start
 23 doing more in-person meetings.

24 And that's pretty much the end of our data
 25 management report. Again, if anyone ever needs

1 anything, this is the -- our brand-new web page on
 2 the DEQ website with all of our stuff about reporting
 3 and spill reporting and OHMERC, CAMEO and everything
 4 else. And this is all we have for the report right
 5 now.

6 So are there any questions or --

7 **MR. HOYLE:** Any questions for Matt or Tom?

8 **MR. BERGMAN:** Did you say something, Cliff?

9 **MR. HOYLE:** I said any questions for Matt or
 10 Tom?

11 **MR. WORMUS:** Thank you. I'll switch this
 12 stuff around, then.

13 **MR. BERGMAN:** I'd like to note that the
 14 national association of which I'm currently the
 15 president had to cancel all their conferences as
 16 well, so we've been doing webinars. And Mr. Galloway
 17 was kind enough to share in one of our webinars last
 18 month which was a panel discussion by LEPC
 19 chairpeople about how their operations had changed
 20 during the pandemic. And we do have a webinar each
 21 month of different kinds of topics. Of course, the
 22 commission members are always welcome to attend and
 23 it's free anyway, so anybody could attend.

24 One of the things that we try to do to keep
 25 real close tabs on is what is the EPA headquarters is

1 up to. And, frankly, I mean, I've been on --
 2 visiting with them the last couple of months.
 3 They're putting out a new LEPC or EPCRA video. So
 4 we're all friends here, right? Sound like to me a
 5 staff that wasn't doing much and got bored and
 6 decided they'd make a video. But we got to make
 7 comments on, got some of the things changed on it.
 8 But, frankly, I don't think anybody -- I don't,
 9 Gabelhouse (phonetic) doesn't have really much of an
 10 idea what's going to go on with EPA concerning EPCRA.

11 We know there's a bunch of things going on at
 12 EPA headquarters, there certainly are a lot. And,
 13 Cliff, we have people from DEQ tracking all kinds of
 14 things EPA headquarters is up to, but I don't hear
 15 them talking about EPCRA very much, so maybe we'll
 16 escape the chisel, but you never know. We -- we do
 17 try to keep track of that.

18 And the other thing I was curious about, if
 19 anybody has any questions about that, you can
 20 certainly get with me offline.

21 **Mr. Graves,** do you participate with the
 22 Carter County LEPC as well?

23 **MR. GRAVES:** Yes, we are a member of the LEPC
 24 and we participate in drills and obviously spill
 25 response and things like that, so --

1 **MR. BERGMAN:** Sure. Who usually attends from
 2 your facility? Is that you or somebody else?

3 **MR. GRAVES:** No, typically in the past it was
 4 our fire chief. It's probably going to be Greg
 5 Elliott for the time being until we make our
 6 transition to a new fire chief there at the
 7 department.

8 **MR. BERGMAN:** Yeah, I haven't been there in
 9 person for a bit, so Carter County's actually kept
 10 having meetings. They never went virtual, as far as
 11 I know. I've been to virtual meetings all over the
 12 state, but I haven't been to one in person since last
 13 March, you know, so I didn't know who was still
 14 actively doing that. I know they're active because I
 15 still get all the emails, come to our meeting, we'll
 16 have pizza, but I can't go.

17 **MR. GRAVES:** Yeah.

18 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Tom, Region 6 EPA, is there
 19 any chance or anyone talking about continuing what
 20 Steve -- his presentations he did for the states, you
 21 know, and for -- in this region? I was wondering
 22 that, because those are really great, but I didn't
 23 figure anyone would pick up that.

24 **MR. BERGMAN:** Actually, Steve went back to
 25 work at EPA as a SEE employee, if you know what that

1 is.

2 **MS. MCKELVEY:** No.

3 **MR. BERGMAN:** Senior environmental employee.

4 So EPA has a long history of bringing their retired

5 personnel, if they're so inclined, back to work for

6 them, but at a part-time level and much less pay and

7 have specific duties or things, but it's a great

8 program.

9 Oftentimes, in my experience through the 25

10 years, the SEE employees were the ones, to me, that

11 had the best ideas and the most knowledge. I mean,

12 they've been around a long time.

13 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Right.

14 **MR. BERGMAN:** Hate for that to go to waste.

15 But they have limited his activities to the regional

16 response team.

17 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Okay.

18 **MR. BERGMAN:** And he's not participating with

19 anything to do with EPCRA and I don't foresee -- he

20 doesn't foresee that will be coming, so this group

21 might want to consider doing those LEPC outreaches

22 now that we can, you know, maybe.

23 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Right.

24 **MR. BERGMAN:** When we can go back to having

25 those.

1 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Yeah, I would really like to

2 do that.

3 **MR. BERGMAN:** You, Curtis, we always had

4 Steve George involved, but he's long gone. I don't

5 know if John Carpenter maybe. Maybe we could all

6 have a discussion about revitalizing or re- -- just

7 simply starting them again as our own outreach.

8 **MS. MCKELVEY:** Okay. Sounds good. Thank

9 you.

10 **MR. HOYLE:** All right. Well, we had a pretty

11 short agenda today, so we've reached the point to

12 anybody wants to bring up any topics before the

13 commission, any new business or questions, concerns

14 anybody wants to bring forth, now is the time.

15 **MR. GALLOWAY:** As a -- I think my appointment

16 is about due, and I didn't know how that's handled.

17 I think my appointment expires in July, so I didn't

18 know what steps DEQ or do I do it or -- as long as

19 I'm still working, I don't mind staying, but I

20 probably need to be reappointed.

21 **MR. HOYLE:** Okay. That'll come through the

22 -- our capitol liaison's office.

23 **MR. GALLOWAY:** Okay.

24 **MR. HOYLE:** So that should just be automatic

25 on the calendar.

2 **MR. HICKMAN:** So, Cliff -- Carl Hickman,

3 state fire marshal's office. Just -- I want to offer

4 my congratulations to you on your promotion or

5 condolences, whichever.

6 And, Tom, I know you and I've crossed paths

7 over the years at different things and events, but

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
